AIDS Candlelight Volunteers & Participants Needed

This year's 2006 International AIDS Candlelight Memorial will take place on Sunday, 21 May 2006 from 8pm - 9pm at Republic Square Park. Volunteers are needed for group and individual speakers, singers, poem readers, performing artists, bands, prayer, remembrances, songs, stats, community literature, music, declarations and commitments. This year service will also host a reading from different AIDS, Community Organizations & Individuals of loved ones lost of the past year.

Austin will host its 7th year participation of this event on 21 May 2006, when millions of individuals in more than 4,500 Communities in 93 countries will also participate in the world's largest and oldest annual grassroots HIV/AIDS event. The International AIDS Candlelight Memorial is designed to honor the memory of those lost to HIV/AIDS, show support for those living with HIV/AIDS, raise awareness of HIV/AIDS, and mobilize community involvement in the fight against HIV/AIDS.

The Global Health Council has selected this year's theme for the 23rd International Candlelight Memorial Service as: "Lighting a Path to a Brighter Future." The local Austin service will host speakers, prayer, music, poems, songs, and candles with loved ones with both new and old friends. This memorial service

will honor the memory of those lost to HIV/AIDS, show support for those living with HIV/AIDS, raise more awareness of HIV/AIDS, and help mobilize community involvement in the fight against HIV/AIDS. Since 1983, the pandemic has claimed more than 28 million lives, with about 42 million now living with HIV and AIDS.

The View from Buzzards' Peak



It is no secret that I have a real love for the campground. What follows is a musing suggested by a recent weekend. Enjoy.

An overnight

I drove up early Saturday morning. Rain had threatened, but I knew it was going to be gone by 10. I stopped along the way at the Best Western Cafe outside of Rockdale to enjoy waffles, a double order of bacon, 2 eggs over easy, 2 large glasses of OJ, and a cup of coffee- juts the thing a bear needs to start off his day. I was really looking forward to an overnight at the Texas Conference of Clubs landsite.

By the time I was done, the sun was out and I put the top down on my old Mustang GT. I had 5 bags of wood chips in the back, along with some food supplies and charcoal. I was meeting my bud Kevin around two o'clock and had some work to do on my small 8 x 8 cabin. It was nicknamed the "Chicken Coop" by my good friend Steve who is convinced that I only date men under 25. The hill it resides on has become known as the "Chicken Ranch" as a result. I have a project going to maintain and improve the area. It is one of the obligations accepted when I was granted the privilege of a permanent campsite over a year ago.

Like Kevin, I enjoy outdoor projects. He was going to help me clear deadwood, rake leaves, work on the paths, and improve a new natural trail down to the compound from the top of the Ranch. The wood chips I got from the Cameron Lumber Yard were going to help us make a stair to ease the climb up the steep hill. On the March Activity Weekend, I had a started constructing a bench out of the natural stone found all over the hill. I also started a common sitting area utilizing a copper fire pit that Tom Bolt had brought out to the place a month before. I had an idea about a new way to light the area that I wanted to try out that evening. I am building the area up and making it more inviting to help encourage more people to camp out up on the Chicken Ranch instead of the place at the bottom of the hill (nicknamed "The Swamp" due to its soggy soil during rains).

After just a few days at the land site, I always return home refreshed, as if I had been on a weeks vacation.

I drove onto the last leg of my trip- the dirt road leading to the land site. I passed the goats, longhorn cattle, Mr. Parker's farmhouse and shed, and finally the vast pastures where Mr. Parker keeps his cows. There was a large herd of them as I took the hairpin turn onto the final straight away. I always like this part of the trip as a sense of relaxation hits me as soon as I see the cows. After driving into the

gate, past the trailers, and down the driveway, through the field and up to the Pole Barn, I unloaded. I put my food in the walk-in cooler, and hauled the bags of wood chips up the hill to the ranch.

I spent the rest of the morning beginning the re-build of the rock wall bench and figuring out how to make better lighting. The previous year, I had installed red railroad lanterns. The light from them was too harsh and got in the way of star gazing. Lights lower to the ground would provide safety and allow better shadows on the trees and forest. After a while, I got a bit tired and snoozed in the hammock.

Kevin arrived on time, got me out of my hammock. He helped me finish the rock wall, paths, and steps. It was all looking really great! We celebrated by taking a long shower. At 6pm, we prepared a dinner of hamburgers, salad, and wine in the kitchen. After that, we climbed the hill to the Ranch and ate ice cream and brownies by the new fire pit. The rocks lights I had made were aglow and cast long shadows across the new paths. Strange noises were coming from the woods and we passed the time by enjoying some pre-embargo cubans I had brought along. Pretty nice for camping! The stars were out, the moon was up and we told stories and continued to enjoy the camaraderie that the land site has become famous for.

During the night, we heard odd noises coming from the field. Grunting noises. We flashed a light outside and saw a glimpse of a furry tail. A little while later, a deer wandered into the firelight-grazing on the grass. Animals in the woods have never bothered me, but there were noises that I had never heard before. The wind in the trees was also up, but the wine and brownies had relaxed me, so I fell asleep listening to the natural symphony around us.

In the morning, we awoke with the sunrise. A sound came from outside the cabin. We peered out and through the trees and saw what appeared to be a dog coming toward the clearing. What emerged was a feral sow and her 12 piglets. They were no more than 100 feet from the cabin door. The sound was a familiar one. We had heard it in the middle of the night. I tried to snap a picture with my digital camera, but the screen was in the way. We watched them for 10 minutes or so, but our own call of nature required a trip out of the cabin. I stomped my foot down hard, making a loud crashing sound. The sow took off across the field and into the woods. It was quite a sight!

I have often seen bears, wolves, bulls, and even large pigs running across the field- but seldom have I seen piglets- although a few chickens have been known to show up from time to time. We should be seeing some of the wild animal life at LoneStar18. See you there!
